





















Get Along!

To prepare the game, print out enough of the following page so that each of your students can have a frown and a smile face. Cut them out and glue a frown and a smile back-to-back on a tongue depressor. Cover with clear contact paper if you would like to use them again. Cut out each of the statements and put them in a bowl.

To play the game, give each child a frown/smile stick. Tell them Jacob and Esau didn't get along, and it caused a lot of unhappiness for everyone in their family (including themselves). We don't want to be like them! Instead, we want to treat our brothers and sisters as God says in our memory verse (Ephesians 4:32). Read a statement from the bowl (or ask a student to take one out and read it). Tell them to show you with their stick if it follows our memory verse or not. If it does not, let a student tell you how this brother/sister could change what he said so it would be pleasing to God.
